Yesteryear Photos...

The picture is of Bret in July 1962 when he was about 16 with a Piper Tri-pacer. He remembers it had a single channel radio with two escapements powered by an OS 19 with throttle butterfly on exhaust. It had left and right rudder on one escapement and about 1/3 or full throttle on the other escapement. Full throttle it would climb and at 1/3 it would slightly descend.
